[CHAPTER I]

LOOKING FORWARD

THIS SUMMER, University of California Extension, Santa Cruz, is pleased to present the ninth in a series of annual workshop/conferences on Charles Dickens. Bringing together many distinguished scholars from throughout the University of California, as well as from other major universities, the program combines formal lectures, small discussion groups and workshops, films of Dickens' works, and video presentations. The comprehensive program is designed for both teachers and the general public.

[CHAPTER II]

PREPARING FOR THE EXHIBITION

THE WEEK-LONG COURSE focuses each summer on a different aspect of the vision of Charles Dickens as revealed in one of his novels. The theme of this summer's course will be "Dickens and Sentimentality."

THE COURSE will focus on one of Dickens' most intriguing novels, *The Old Curiosity Shop*, which contains such memorable characters as Dick Swiveller, Sampson and Sally Brass, Little Nell, and the grotesque, violent dwarf, Quilp. Lectures will explore the novel's curious interweaving of comic and sentimental themes, its attitudes toward childhood, sexuality, and death, as well as its remarkable panoramic view of Victorian England at a moment of profound social upheaval. Attention will be paid to Dickens' use of earlier, populist forms of entertainment and to the biographical and historical contexts of the novel. (For purposes of common reference, the Penguin edition of the novel is strongly recommended.)

In Addition to lectures and workshops, the course will feature dramatic readings from the novels, evening sherry hours, and other festive events of an appropriately Dickensian nature. A special feature of the 1989 program will be lectures on Victorian popular culture in conjunction with a weekend conference on "Sentimentality: Dickens, Sentimentality, Victorian Culture."

[CHAPTER IV]

A JOYFUL OCCASION

WEEKEND CONFERENCE

FROM THURSDAY EVENING, August 3, through Sunday afternoon, August 6, the Dickens Project, will present a scholarly conference on "Sentimentality: Dickens, Sentimentality, Victorian Culture," to which all Dickens Universe participants are invited. Featured speakers during the weekend will include George Ford, Deirdre David, Steven Marcus, Philip Collins, Catherine Gallagher, as well as other prominent literary scholars and social historians of Victorian England. The conference program will include lectures and panel discussions on Dickens and other Victorian novelists as well as on larger questions of feeling and value in the Victorian age.

[CHAPTER V]

AMONG THE SHOWMEN

COORDINATOR

JOHN O. JORDAN, Associate Professor of English, teaches Victorian literature, especially Dickens, at the University of California, Santa Cruz. He is Director of the Dickens Project.

FACULTY

MURRAY BAUMGARTEN, Professor of English and Comparative Literature at UC Santa Cruz, is Founding Director of the Dickens Project. He has published studies of Dickens, Carlyle, Mill, and other Victorian writers, and is a member of the editorial board of *Dickens Studies Annual*.

Professor **PHILIP COLLINS** of the University of Leicester in Great Britain is one of the world's foremost Dickens scholars. He is the author of *Dickens and Crime, Dickens and Education* and many other studies of Dickens' life and writings.

Professor **EDWIN EIGNER** teaches nineteenth-century English and American literature at UC Riverside. He is the author of several books, including *The Metaphysical Novel: Dickens, Bulwer, Melville, and Hawthorne*, and, most recently, *The Dickens Pantomime*, published by the University of California Press.

Professor FRED KAPLAN of Queens College and the Graduate Center of the City University of New York is the Editor of *Dickens Studies Annual*. His many publications include *Dickens and Mesmerism: The Hidden Springs of Fiction* and *Thomas Carlyle: A Biography.* His most recent book, *Dickens: A Biography*, is now available from Morrow.

Professor **JAMES KINCAID** holds the Aerol Arnold endowed chair of English Literature at the University of Southern California. His writings include *Dickens and the Rhetoric of Laughter*, in addition to books on Tennyson and Trollope.

PATRICK McCarthy is Professor of English at UC Santa Barbara and the author of *Matthew Arnold and the Three Classes*. He has written widely on Victorian literature, including Dickens. Professor **ROBERT POLHEMUS** teaches Victorian and modern British literature at Stanford University. He is the author of *The Changing World of Anthony Trollope* and *Comic Faith*, which contains a chapter on Dickens.

PAUL SCHLICKE is Lecturer in English at the University of Aberdeen. He is author of *Dickens and Popular Entertainment* and (with Priscilla Schlicke) *The Old Curiosity Shop: An Annotated Bibliography.*

HILARY SCHOR is Assistant Professor of English at the University of Southern California. She has written on Dickens, Doris Lessing, and others, and has recently completed a book on the novels of Elizabeth Gaskell.

Professor **ROBERT TRACY**, of the English faculty at UC Berkeley, teaches nineteenth-century English and Irish literature. He is the author of *Trollope's Later Novels* and of many essays on Dickens and Victorian fiction.

PREPARATION FOR THE JOURNEY

SUMMER IN SANTA CRUZ

THE SANTA CRUZ CAMPUS is located at the northern end of scenic Monterey Bay. San Francisco is 75 miles north; San Jose is 40 minutes away. Monterey, directly across the bay, can be reached in an hour; Carmel is a few minutes beyond. The climate is mild, with cool mornings and evenings, and warm afternoons.

DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS, there is a shortage of off-campus housing in Santa Cruz and surrounding areas. For this reason, we suggest that you stay in campus residence halls, unless you are able to make your own housing arrangements. Campus housing is reasonable and convenient to course activities.

ON SATURDAYS, Sundays, and after 5 P.M. on weekdays, you may park at no charge in Lots A, B, or C, and in metered Visitor Parking areas. Please avoid spaces restricted to UCSC personnel. A permit is required for weekday parking between 8 A.M. and 5:30 P.M.

CREDIT/FEE

2 UNITS of credit (quarter system) in Literature, \$88; non-credit, \$85. For those who have attended The Dickens Universe previously, and for those whose enrollment is received by July 1, fees will be discounted to \$78 for credit and \$75 for non-credit. Enrollment is limited. Credit is available in either post-baccalaureate or undergraduate units, and the course is approved to be repeated for credit.

STUDENTS expecting to take the course for credit will be expected to write a paper 5–7 typewritten pages in length, which will be due August 30. The topic of the paper will be discussed at the program.

MEALS and lodging are not included in the course fee. Students staying off-campus may purchase meals in the campus cafeteria on a cash basis.





This summer, University of California Extension, Santa Cruz, is pleased to present the ninth in a series of annual workshop/conferences on Charles Dickens. Because a segment of the program presents teaching strategies, this course is of particular interest to teachers of English literature. It is also designed to increase the pleasure of reading Dickens for people who already love to read his work as well as those discovering him for the first time. The week-long course focuses each summer on a different aspect of the vision of Charles Dickens as revealed in one of his novels. The theme of this summer's course will be "Dickens and Sentimentality."

The course will focus on one of Dickens' most intriguing novels, *The Old Curiosity Shop*, which contains such memorable characters as Dick Swiveller, Sampson and Sally Brass, Little Nell, and the grotesque, violent dwarf, Quilp. Lectures will explore the novel's curious interweaving of comic and sentimental themes, its attitudes toward childhood, sexuality, and death, as well as its remarkable panoramic view of Victorian England at a moment of profound social upheaval. Attention will be paid to Dickens' use of earlier, populist forms of entertainment and to the biographical and historical contexts of the novel. (For purposes of common reference, the Penguin edition of the novel is strongly recommended.)

Featured lecturers at the conference will include Paul Schlicke from the University of Aberdeen, Scotland; Philip Collins from the University of Leicester, England; and David Parker from the Dickens House Museum, London. Fred Kaplan, author of *Dickens: A Biography*, will also be in attendance.

In addition to lectures and workshops, the course will feature dramatic readings from the novels, evening sherry hours, special viewing of the Dickens Player's recent video productions, and other festive events of an appropriately Dickensian nature. The annual Universe Bookfair will exhibit new titles from many publishers as well as rare Dickensian books from Herb Furse, The Bookman.

Universe participants may also take advantage of lectures on Victorian popular culture that will be given in conjunction with a weekend conference on "Sentimentality: Dickens, Sentimentality, Victorian Culture." This conference will run from August 3—6.

GREAT EXPECTATIONS AND HARD TIMES HANDBOOK WORKSHOP

On Sunday, July 30, 12:00 noon—5:00 p.m., a special workshop will be held to help teachers learn to use the *Great Expectations* and *Hard Times* resource handbooks and videos in their classroom. These resource packages are the product of a group of 20 teachers who worked with the Dickens Project to collect, edit, and write a series of handbooks that would not only provide historical, interpretive, and social background to Dickens' novels, but would also suggest how to use that information in the classroom itself. The packages also include a video tape of the Dickens Players performing scenes from each novel. This workshop is being conducted by Judith A. Machado, M.A., and Gail Starkey-Oliver, M.A., both high school English teachers in California.
